Lhartum Hospital Report

As of June 30 your patient transportation fund provided for 45 active patients attending 57 on site patient visits at Shriners Hospitals for Children/Shriners Children's, 4 telehealth and accepted 4 new patients. The 3 patients who received telehealth visits were with our medical staff from the Canadian hospital. The patient transportation fund costs to the end of June are about \$100,400.00, which includes about \$72,000.00 in donations toward flights from West Jet and Air Canada.

In 2023, 34 patients had visits to the Shriners Hospital for Children-Canada, while 23 patients attended appointments at Shriners Children's Twin Cities. Shriners Children's Twin Cities patients that need surgeries other than day surgery are recommended to transfer to SHC Canada for the operations and then return to SC TC after for follow up. I have 1 patient from Twin Cities that is scheduled for surgery at SHC Canada in August. As new patients seek our help, I recommend they apply to Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada direct. I provide the application and coordinates to them to make applying as seamless as possible.

Shriners Hospitals for Children – Canada remains one of the busiest facilities in the Shrine system. As of the end of May they had held 115 outreach clinics, had 2748 new referrals, had 3,300 new patient visits with a total of 12,229 patient visits to the end of May. The staff conducted 521 operations accounting for 79% OR usage based on staff availability. The OR waiting list as of May 31 is 634 patients. The average daily census is 5.8 patients in hospital (bums in beds at midnight) to the end of May.

At Shriners Hospitals for Children/ Shriners Children's, we support families by providing access to quality care. Acceptance is based solely on a child's medical needs,

regardless of their family's ability to pay or their insurance status. Shriners Children's is committed to providing innovative and compassionate care to children. To qualify for care, a child must be younger than age 18 when their care plan begins and have a condition that falls into one of our specialty areas (Orthopedics, Cleft Lip & Palate, Spinal Injuries and Burn Injuries). Shriners have facilities throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico, as well as a number of outreach clinics internationally. As part of our commitment to families and children, we also welcome patients from anywhere in the world.

Our team of highly qualified specialists is here for the patients and families. When they put their trust in us to provide treatment for their child, our focus will be on achieving the most positive and significant long-term outcome for them.

If you have a child or know of one who has a condition that our system specializes in, we would be happy to work with the family to get started on a care plan.

The Child life specialists skillfully incorporate play in the clinical setting. With their knowledge, training and understanding of child development, child life specialists work directly with patients and their families to help them feel more comfortable, calm and confident when visiting Shriners Children's for a medical procedure. They provide support and education as they engage patients in play throughout all aspects of their hospital experience. Child life specialists work with patients and families to develop coping skills. Engaging patients in medical play gives a child the opportunity to see, touch and feel many of the items they will see and experience on the day of surgery. Incorporating play, especially in pre -op and the operating room, promotes confidence in a potentially stressful environment. Play experi-



ences also help children express fears and manage misconceptions of medical procedures. "To make the anesthesia mask less scary, we may play with it by practicing deep breaths on a stuffed animal," said Danielle, a child life specialist at Shriners Children's Boston. "Offering choices or roles gives the whole family a sense of control and empowerment in a situation that can be overwhelming."

Shriners Children's medical teams take their trainings and treatments around the globe.

Planes, trains and automobiles – it doesn't matter which mode of transportation it takes. The medical team of Shriners Children's is on a mission to share knowledge and provide care to patients across the world. Over the last 100 years, Shriners Children's has treated more than 1.5 million children from more than 170 countries and provided education to healthcare professionals globally.

Through outreach mission trips. Shriners Children's clinicians have taken it to another level, educating local medical teams in foreign counties. Long after Shriners Children's teams return home, the local professionals can continue to care for the patients the way our team would. After a three-year hiatus due to the pandemic, travel to international countries has resumed. Most recently, a team from several Shriners Children's locations returned to Cyprus, an island country located in the eastern Mediterranean Sea. While there, the team saw 143 patients. In addition to patients from Cyprus, children from various countries, including Egypt, Lebanon, Greece and Turkey, attended the clinic. Medical students and faculty also attended lectures. Parents, caregivers, patients and volunteers expressed their gratitude to the Shriners Children's team for traveling to provide worldclass specialty care and creating an immediate impact.

Another team recently traveled to El Salvador to provide medical intervention to pa-

tients with scoliosis. While in El Salvador, the Shriners Children's team trained groups of nurses using a mobile simulation lab the team brought with them.

As we work to turn 'treating more kids in more places' into a farreaching reality with extraordinary impact, clinics like the one we conducted in El Salvador serve as the model," said Michael Wattenbarger, M.D., pediatric orthopedic surgeon, Physician Medical Group Leader, Shriners Children's Greenville. "We are accomplishing much more than changing the lives of the children we've personally cared for in this immediate moment; we are training doctors and nurses there to continue the work we began far into the future. Making this undertaking even more achievable is the unwavering support of the Shriners in Central America. They are entirely dedicated to the mission of Shriners Children's – and to bring that mission to the doorsteps of families in their home country."

Learning on-site at Shriners Children's

In addition to taking part in international teachings, our locations have welcomed others to learn within our facilities. Recently, Shriners Children's Texas hosted Patricia Elizabeth Quezada de Calderón, M.D., and a nursing team from El Salvador to offer the latest training in burn care. "It's heartening to see the international collaboration taking place in the field of burn care," said Mary K. Glendening, RN, MSN, FACHE, administrator, Shriners Children's Texas. "This knowledge-sharing can significantly impact patient outcomes, especially in countries where resources and expertise may be limited."

Burn injuries are a significant public health concern globally, and the Shriners Children's team helps to ensure professionals have the skills and knowledge they need to provide the best care to their patients. "We want our patients to experience and receive the best care possible," said Dr. Calderón from Benjamin Bloom's Children's Hospital in El Salvador.

"We want to take back as much knowledge and teach our coworkers. We want to optimize what we have at our own hospital."

Into the future

Receiving expert care close to home means so much to the families seen at our outreach clinics, and there are many more patients to see and lives to touch. "These international educational efforts are all part of Shriners Children's mission to extend our reach by helping more kids in more places, now and in the future," said Laura Kozloski, Ph.D., executive director of international strategy, Shriners Children's.

Shriners Children's Twin Cities had a short meeting as they held a noon BBQ for the staff, which were very appreciative. So, here is a short version. Twin Cities has hired a part time surgeon and visiting with another potential one, post Covid Clinic appointments about average. Shriners Children's Twin Cities is having 100th anniversary public celebration on August 6 at clinic in the parking lot; this event is open to Shriners, patients, staff and families

The Midwest market project is moving forward. As cost cutting measures, they have combined purchasing agent, credentialing, and some marketing into central location. Midwest market covers Shriners Childrens Twin Cities, Dayton, St Louis, and Chicago. More information will be forth coming as this project moves forward.

The Twin Cities Summer camps were discussed; most are filled. A new one is a boundary waters trip which maxed out at 12 for first year and is full! Twin Cities is one of the few facilities that has/sponsors camps.

The Spring Gala had record attendance as a fund raiser although final numbers have not been verified but should be available shortly.

Shriners Children's Twin Cities recently switched electronic medical record program to EPIC which is more compatible with larger health care systems like Sanford for patient information exchange. This new Epic system is having a few hiccoughs that need to be corrected.

At Shriners Hospitals for Children and Shriners Children's, our staff is committed to reaching as many children as possible, wherever they may live, and offering them our unique, patient-centered, wraparound care.

Nobles, thank you for everything you, your ladies and your family do to assist the children in our care. Please remember, we do not provide "free care". We offer "the best care anywhere!!!" regardless of the patient's or family's ability to pay.



Today I have a HUGE win to report to you, and I'm so proud, because we achieved this win together: The first six months of 2023 have yielded an overall net **MEMBERSHIP GROWTH!**

The last time we know that this achievement was confirmed, Bill Clinton was the US President and Jean Chretien was Prime Minister of Canada. Hitting this incredible milestone is tangible proof of something we Shriners have always known: Good men are hungry to incorporate more fun and fellowship into their lives. They value meaningful connections with other people, and they long to be a part of something greater than themselves. They are finding all of this with us, as Shriners.

How did Shriners turn things around? By remembering who we are as Shrine Masons, by intentionally putting in the work, and by giving one another unwavering support. This milestone is a culmination of team effort across many skill positions to get us across the goal line. Here are some areas we've worked on to demonstrate and increase our value as an organization to current and potential members:

Event & Activities Growth

In order to broaden our appeal, we focused heavily on the concepts of generational investment and "building your own experience." We've encouraged Nobles to create new avenues for enjoying fun and fellowship and invested in their ideas. In 2022, Nobles across Shrinedom created more than 110 new clubs and units. Education Growth

A wonderful way to close the evening. Celebrating the shared history and ties between Freemasonry and the Shrine.

149th Shrine Imperial Session — July 2-6, Charlotte, NC

The 149th Shrine Imperial Session was held July 2-6 in Charlotte, NC. Myself and Chief Rabban attended as voting delegates for Khartum.

Voting delegates were asked to register each time they entered the meeting in the morning and again in the afternoon to verify attendance and remove the need for an attendance roll call should a vote be lacking in members.

Multiple pieces of legislation were voted on such as relocating Shrine Temples and transfers between Shrine Associations.

There were some votes taken that may be of interest to the Khartum Nobility (note that changing bylaws requires a 2/3 majority vote).

Proposed Amendment #2: "Each Temple would be entitled to a minimum of 2 (two) elected Representatives". This was brought forth regarding Temples with smaller memberships that are only entitled to a single voting Representative. This motion failed to pass.

Proposed Amendment #3: if a government-declared state of emergency exists in the area of any Temple, that would prevent Representatives of that Temple from attending the annual Imperial Session, the Representatives of that Temple could participate in the annual Imperial Session for that year by way of videoconferencing or such other method as determined by the board of directors to allow such Representatives to attend and vote. This motion failed to pass. The motion was brought forth by Rameses Shrine (Toronto). They referenced the COVID-19 Pandemic that made it difficult for their Nobles to travel to the US to participate. Discussion concerned the vague language of this motion, including a lack of clarity on which level of government (Federal, Provincial, Municipal) could declare a State of Emergency. Also noted was a lack of clarity regarding what constitutes such an emergency, as it was noted the Federal Government of Canada declared a State of Emergency regarding the Trucker Convoy Protest last year.

Proposed Amendment #5: a Temple could accept a petition from a candidate who is in good standing as a Mason, but not necessarily a Master Mason (meaning the Shrine could accept petitions from Entered Apprentice Masons). This motion failed to pass.

Proposed Amendment #7: a candidate who is a resident of the United States of America could apply for membership in any temple in the USA. Although this legislation would apply only to the USA, if passed it would establish a precedent whereby any Noble in Canada would then be able to apply for membership in any other Temple, and not necessarily be required to apply to Khartum, or the Temple of jurisdiction for their location. This motion failed to pass.

Proposed Amendments #27 and #28: granted a Charter to Salah Shriners in the state of Santa Catarine in Brazil, and also to Lubnan Shriners in the Republic of Lebanon, respectively. Both of these motions passed, and charters were granted to both

Shrine Temples.

The biggest topic of debate and discussion was Proposed Amendment #4: the per capita tax would increase from \$30 to \$60 for each member of a Temple.

There was much discussion and debate regarding this amendment. Imperial officers discussed the financial situation of Shriners International, and the need for increased funding to ensure financial stability in the coming years. Many Nobles from the floor expressed concern on the detrimental effect this could have on Shrine membership and the financial stability of individual Temples. The discussion was passionate, but professional and respectful.

This motion was defeated. The official vote was 403 votes yes, and 208 votes no. Although yes votes were in the majority, they failed to reach the 2/3 requirement of 408 votes. The following day, as happened last year, a Noble came to the stage, announcing that he had voted against the per capita increase, but had now reconsidered, and wished to bring the motion up for another vote.

Again, there was much spirited debate and discussion. Multiple amendments were proposed by the Nobility on the floor. Ultimately, the amendment agreed to by a majority of the Nobility was to vote on an increase of the per capita from \$30 to \$50 (USD). This vote was adopted. Effective immediately, the per capita for each member of a Shrine Temple for 2024 is now \$50 USD, plus the \$5 Hospital fee.

This was a very interesting display of the majesty of the democratic

system. Although the Imperial Potentate and the Imperial Divan did not receive the amount of money they were asking for, they thanked the Nobility present for a having a vigorous debate on this subject, but remaining cordial and respectful throughout the process.

Pursuant to §331.5(a) of Shriners International bylaws: "when a change is made by Shriners International affecting Shrine law, and the change affects the bylaws of any temple, the bylaws of the temple are changed, ipso facto, to conform with Shriners International". In common language, this means that the increase in per capita is automatically added to Khartum Shrine's membership dues for 2024.

Also at Imperial Session, we were introduced to our two new Shrine Patient Ambassadors. Giana has been a Shrine Patient since 2008, being treated for limb deficiency at Shriners Children's Southern California. Juan Diego has been a Shrine Patient

since 2018, being treated for electrical burn injuries at Shriners Children's Boston.

Both of these patients were introduced by video packages, and both provided inspirational speeches detailing their experiences with Shriners Children's Health Care System.

This was a very strong reminder of the higher purpose in why we do what we do as Shriners. Noble Darrell and I were lucky enough to get our picture taken with Giana and Juan Diego (see page 15).

Of course, the highlight of the Imperial Session was the installation of our new Imperial Potentate, Imperial Sir James "Ed" Stolze.

Thank you to Lady Tara, and also to Noble Darrell Rostek, Lady Lisa Rostek and Dean Rostek for joining me in representing Khartum Shrine at Shrine Imperial Session.

There is no official restriction on any Noble belonging to more than one Shrine Temple. Shriners International bylaws, §.323.7(a) gives the following direction on Association: Any Noble may apply for an associate membership in a second temple and, if accepted by the second, thereafter hold associate membership subject to the provisions of this section.

There is also no official restriction on any Noble belonging to more than one Shrine Club or Unit. I myself belong to Sioux Lookout Shrine Club, Khartum Shrine Ritualistic Unit and Wolf Pack Shrine Club.

My understanding is that in years past, when there was a larger number of Shrine Nobles, there may have been an unwritten rule, or accepted custom, that a Noble should choose one particular Shrine Club or Unit and commit to that specific Club or Unit. However, in recent years, we simply no longer have the luxury of an excess of Shrine

Nobles to make these requests of. I should note that it is entirely possible that a particular Shrine Temple, or a Shrine Club or Unit, may choose to amend their own bylaws concerning membership in their Temple/Club/Unit regarding Associate Membership in another Shrine Temple/Club/Unit. If a Temple, Club or Unit chose to do this, that would be their own prerogative. And Nobles could then decide if they wished to join this particular Shrine Temple/Club/Unit and be bound by this policy.

I hope this helps to clear that up.

As always, before I wrap up, I must give thanks to Lady Lindsey Lorteau for her tireless work in putting together the Khartum Khronicle. Lindsey is always so patient with me, as I am always late in getting her my articles for the Khronicle, for a number of reasons. Lindsey, I can't thank you enough for the work you put in to make me and Khartum look good to everybody reading this. Your efforts are greatly appreciated by many people, including me. Thank you.


Thank you to Lady Liz Ward and Lady Kelli Egerter, my co-chairs for this event. Well done!



A few of our Nobles were able to attend the July 4 parade in Tofte, MN, and are looking forward to the upcoming parade in Pinawa on July 15.


On Tuesday July 25 we are holding a steak BBQ at the residence of Noble Peter Knudsen. We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible for this event.
